Sheboygan County Master Gardener Association Membership 2023 By Val Gillman, Treasurer

Welcome members, new and old, to our restructured association. Over the last couple of years, there have been many changes the Wisconsin Master Gardener, which have affected our membership. When we sponsored our last class for certification (2017-18), we had 108 members. Then came the start of digitizing the system and many were overwhelmed with the changes and expectations for logging their volunteer hours into the UW database system. This was followed by COVID and the many restrictions and changes it caused.

We hope the restructuring of our new association will attract more members. All members still have the option to be a certified master gardener by following the UW guidelines for volunteer work, education, and using the Online Reporting System (ORS). Members who choose not to continue with the UW certification process will still need to volunteer and attend some continuing education, but will not be required to record their hours.

I am happy to say that we currently have 44 members, of which 26 have also joined WIMGA (Wisconsin Master Gardener Association). As the year progresses, we will be looking for people to volunteer on the Membership Committee; duties would include recruiting new members, creating new member packets, and maintaining the current membership information. If you would like to work on this committee, make sure to let us know. "Growing" our association will require all of us to take a part. Below is how our membership has changed over the years.

Can flats be mixed or do they need to be all one type of plant? Yes, you can mix flats. A flat of annual flowers is 10 four packs of annual flowers and costs \$20.00. A flat of vegetables is 10 four packs of vegetables and costs \$25.00. (You cannot mix vegetables and flowers together in one flat.)

WHEN AND HOW TO "UNFRIEND" A PLANT. [FINE GARDENING, AUG 2]



Because life is too short, a plant needs to go, if....

- 1. It doesn't keep its promises to thrive in your garden. Cut it loose for a more robust match.
- 2. It refuses to take care of its own health and well-being. No one needs a plant that regularly needs care to prevent or cure disease or insect attacks.
- 3. *It's high maintenance.* Busy work like staking, deadheading, pruning, frequent dividing, fertilizing, etc. will exhaust your patience and energy.

- 4. **The plant is overbearing**. Some plants are just not a good fit for the space they occupy, growing larger than you thought they would and overwhelming your garden.
- 5. You've grown apart. Some plants are great when you first meet them, but your tastes change, and you cease to notice or get pleasure from them.
- 6. **The plant is holding you back from meeting new plants.** If your space is limited, you must be ruthless; and if you want to try new introductions, you'll have to rehome some old ones. It's okay to want shiny new plants.

HOW TO KILL A TREE [VIRGINIA COOPERATIVE EXTENSION]

Trees are a precious resource in a landscape. They are expensive to purchase, take years to grow to mature beauty, and are easy to kill.

Few residential trees die of "old age." Mechanical damage and improper tree planting and care kill more trees than insects and disease. Here are just a few ways to kill a tree. A graphic that will show you many additional ways to kill your tree can be found at the <u>Virginia Cooperative Extension</u> site.



"Top" a tree to encourage waterspouts that weaken tree and encourage diseases and pests.

Leave codominant leaders to encourage 'V' growth causing splitting in winds and storms. Coat pruning cuts with paint or sealer to slow wound healing.

Leave broken branches unpruned to attract pests.

Spray unapproved herbicide over root area to weaken tree. Prune flush cuts to reduce wound closure.

Dig hole too narrow and over amend backfill to discourage proper root spread.

DIY GERMINATION BOX [GARDEN GATE MAGAZINE, FEBRUARY 2023]

When starting seeds indoors, a humid environment is critical. A DIY germination box can be created using shallow plastic storage bins like those that fit under your bed or hold roles of wrapping paper. Put your seed starting containers on top of the upsidedown lid and place the bin over the top to create a mini-greenhouse. If needed, a heating mat can be placed on the lid and under your pots. The bin is easy to store and will last for many years.
